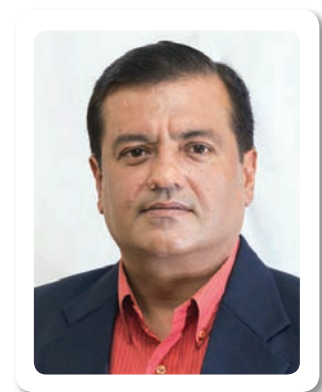

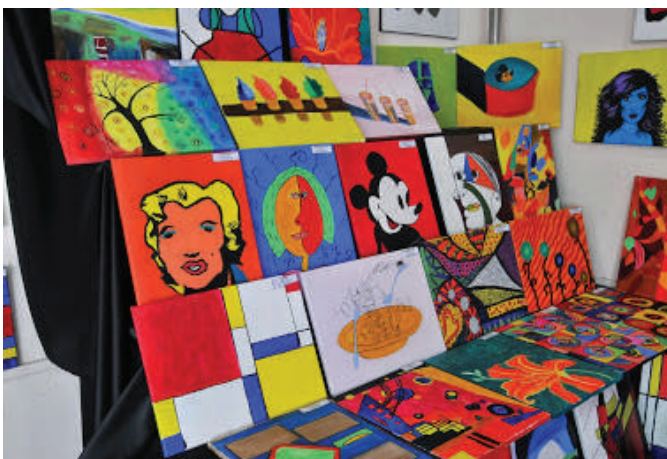

SCHOOL IN ACTION

SONY CREATIVE TOY MAKING COMPETITION

A toy making competition was organised on April 11, 2014, for Classes 1 - 7. The Sony Creative Science Award (SCSA): Creative Toy Competition is an annual competition jointly organised by Science Centre, Singapore, and Sony Electronics Asia Pacific Pte Ltd. The main objective of this competition was to promote creativity amongst primary students so that they learn about science beyond classrooms in a fun and enjoyable way.

INDIAN REPUBLIC CELEBRATIONS

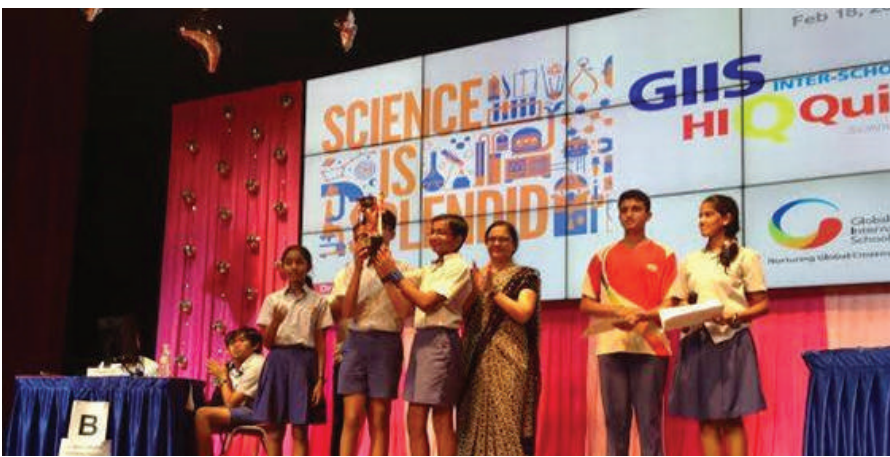

ECOPONICS

GREEN EFFORTS

Ecaponics is an organisation which aims to enrich and educate students through a hands-on learning experience through Aquaponics which is an ecosystem where both plants and fishes depend on each other to survive happily. Water from the fish tank which is highly rich in nutrients is pumped from the tank into the vegetable growbed as fertilisers for the vegetables. Water would then trickle through the growbed and back into the tank. Students of Class 5 and teachers attended an Aquaponics Enrichment Session on January 12, 2015 and got to know more about how it is done.

PLANTING SEEDS OF HOPE TALK BY DR JANE GOODALL

Dr. Jane Goodall, an English primatologist, ethologist, anthropologist and UN Messenger of Peace gave a talk on 'Planting Seeds of Hope' on February 2, 2015 at UniSIM. Considered to be the world's foremost expert on chimpanzees, Goodall is best known for her 55-year study of social and family interactions of wild chimpanzees in Gombe Stream National Park, Tanzania. She is the founder of the Jane Goodall Institute and the Roots & Shoots programme and she has worked extensively on conservation and animal welfare issues. The Roots & Shoots programme is about fostering respect

and compassion for all living things, to promote understanding of all cultures and to inspire each individual to take action to make the world a better place. Ms. Jigna Shah, Ms. Fulva Shah and Ms. Aparajita Ghosh attended the talk.

As a follow-up to the February 2 talk, the Jane Goodall Institute (Singapore) (JGIS) held an educators' workshop entitled "Planting Seeds of Hope" on February 28, 2015 to equip educators with the strategies and tools to facilitate student-initiated Values-in-Action projects through Roots and Shoots.



GARDENER'S DAY OUT (GDO)

On February 7, 2015, teachers, Ms. Arpita N. and Ms. Sandhya D. attended a talk on the topic of 'Rooftop Farming' at Hort Park. The event at GDO provided a focal point where all the gardeners could re-equip themselves with more gardening knowledge and resources. Ms. Jennifer Tan (CIB - Community in Boom Ambassador) shared her experiences in managing rooftop farming and she evaluated roof

AXS AMAZING SCIENCE CHALLENGE

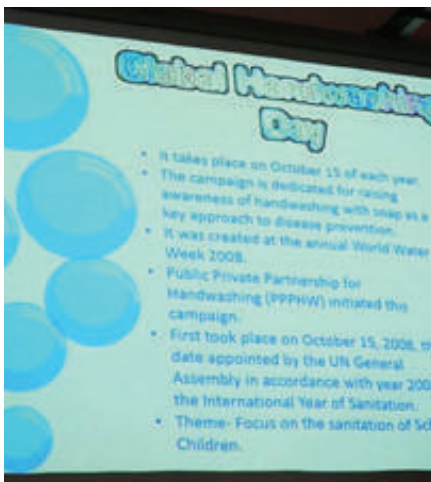

EDUCATIONAL JOURNEY TO SINGAPORE GARDEN FESTIVAL

The Singapore Garden Festival is a biennial garden and flower show held in Singapore, organised by the National Parks Board of Singapore in partnership with the other organisations.

It is the only International garden show in the tropics to showcase creations from the world's top award winning garden and floral designers under one roof. This year Herbal Garden Team from Class 8A set up a booth in the fest. GIIS initiates green activities to promote and emphasize on the importance of our mantra: Reduce-Reuse-Recycle. This was a great opportunity for students to learn and share ideas on topics like innovation and gardening. Ideas were shared on the school's 'Herbal Garden' greening efforts, through the use of recycled materials like coconut shells, milk and plastic bottles for gardening and how the 'Herbal Garden Green Club' sells a variety of plants like basil, aloe vera on occasions like Earth day and Sports day. It was a therapeutic educational journey as students were also taught to make organic compost with animal waste. The festival also provided a great interactive platform to students as they engaged with other schools such as Kranji Secondary School, Siloso Beach Resort, GIIS Balestier Campus and various other organisations.



ABC WATERS

Budding environmentalists of Class 6 attended a two part workshop called ABC Waters Bedok Reservoir Learning trail on July 30 and August 4, 2014. Organised by PUB, the National Water Agency that manages Singapore's water supply, the aim of the workshop was to create awareness among students about the importance of water sustainability in Singapore. Special emphasis was laid on understanding how the Bedok Reservoir has been transformed into a place where people come for recreation, sports and community bonding while providing a natural habitat to many birds, fishes and other wildlife.

The first part of the workshop was held at Bedok Reservoir and the students learnt more about the ABC Waters programme. This included hands on activity of testing the water for debris, smell, turbidity, dissolved oxygen and pH. The second part of the workshop was held at the NEWater Visitor Centre where the students were introduced to the strategies required in supervising or managing other students attending Learning Trail at Bedok Reservoir. Lesson plan and guidelines were provided to enable students to cover the themes associated with the ABC Waters Learning Trail at Bedok Reservoir. Students were able to learn more about fostering common responsibility towards conserving water while valuing and enjoying the water resources in Singapore.

PANASONIC ECO IDEAS CHALLENGE 2014

On September 18, 2014 a team of three students, Rahul Parthasarathy, Rahul Arvind and Rohit Ponshe of Class 9C participated in the final round of the NEA- Panasonic Eco Ideas Challenge 2014. Their Project 'Harness food to Fuel Energy' received a seed funding award of \$500. Students set up a bio gas plant in the school. Their work was presented in the form of a PowerPoint presentation and a small movie that demonstrated their journey throughout the project. The judges were impressed by their work and commented that theirs was a very powerful presentation.



CLEAN & GREEN SINGAPORE WORKSHOP

On November 4 and 5, 2014 Global Perspectives students of Class 9 and students of Class 7 got the opportunity to visit the Green Carnival at ITE College (East). Accompanied by three teachers they participated in various workshops and events. Presentations by the students of Kranji Secondary School and Yuan Hua Secondary School gave them an insight about the various eco-friendly methods employed in the schools of London and how they can be applied at school and at home. They learnt about bird feeders, bird houses, bug hotels and compost bins. The students were delighted when they got to make their own compost bins as a part of a hands-on activity. They learnt about upcycling environment. Students made their own terrariums and upcycled old t-shirts into various products. This was indeed an enriching and upcycled experience for the students as they also interacted with students from other schools. Class 7 students went to ITE College (East) to attend a presentation by students of a school in Malaysia and shared their experience with fellow students at GIIS.

PARENT ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME

On October 1, 2014 Mr Srikant, Manager at Philips Electronics, visited GIIS East Coast Campus as part of the Parent Engagement Programme. Through such initiatives the school aims to provide students an opportunity to learn from experienced professionals who have excelled in their fields. Addressing students of Classes 7 and 8, Mr Srikant spoke about opportunities that life gives to change, develop and grow. He also briefed students about the 70:20:10 ratio or the “formula to success”. At school, one spends 70% of one’s time learning, 20% observing and 10% doing but when one starts working, 70% of the time is spent doing, 20% observing and 10% learning. The most important thing is to be sensitive towards one’s surroundings and people, he said. Through this workshop, students got to learn more about soft skills and life lessons. The talk ended with an interactive question and answer sessions.

THE ILTC CAMP

Six student members from GIIS East Coast Campus Interact Club attended the ILTC leadership camp. Leadership, Interaction, Team Work and Acceptance towards community were the four main aspects. It was a two-day, one night camp. The activities included icebreaker challenges, to allow students to interact, get to know and mingle with each other. The first challenge called the ‘Face-to-Face challenge’, had four groups that debated about the topic of ‘including community service in their curriculum’. The team that came up with good arguments and suggestions to tackle other opinions won the debate.

In the next challenge, students had to transfer a dummy casualty on a stretcher from one place to another, through various patterns of logs. Walking on logs required a great deal of balance – they could achieve this task successfully with combined efforts of their team members. It was a great learning experience for all of them.



‘THE LEADERS OF TOMORROW’

Ms Suchitra Narayan, an Alumni of Harvard Graduate School of Education and President of the Indian Epilepsy Association, Cochin, is a teacher trainer and special educator with more than 30 years of varied and rich experience. She runs an NGO – a Resource Centre for Inclusion - SANSKRITI at Cochin, Kerala, and is a Consultant with Learning Support at Srishti (Bangalore).

In an interactive session held on November 5, 2014 with the students of Classes 4 - 10, she spoke on the topic of ‘The Leaders of Tomorrow’, and how everyone needs to have empathy, sensitivity and respect towards people who are different i.e. learners with special needs, learning difficulties, learning disabilities etc. and about their inclusion in mainstream classrooms. VIDEO CONFERENCE INTERACTION WITH DR D SUBBARAO, FORMER GOVERNOR RBI

On October 9, 2014 students of GIIS East Coast Campus were privileged to interact with the 22nd Governor of RBI, Dr D Subbarao. Students from GIIS Tokyo, GIIS Kuala Lumpur and GIIS East Coast Campuses were able to be a part of the event through a video conference with the organising campus GIIS Queenstown. The students gained insight into the world of finance - prices, currencies and markets. His talk helped students understand inflation, its repercussions and process of printing and distribution of currency. Dr Subbarao spoke in depth on the complexity of financial terms and jargons in simple terminology.



YEO'S NDP HDB PROJECT 2014

Coinciding with Singapore's 49th National Day and to mark 49 years of Singapore's progress and infrastructure achievements, public housing remained the focus of NDP HDB recycling project for 2014. HDB flats, representative of each decade from 1960s to 2010s, chronicled its history and evolution through time. 48 kindergartens in Singapore were selected to participate in this project, GIIS East Coast Campus was one of them.

Yeo's recycled Tetra Pak packaging materials were collected and used to construct a block of flats of the decade chosen for our Kindergarten - 1960s. Students worked with recycled materials to complete the project with support from Kindergarten teachers. The aim of the project was to partner with selected kindergartens to build 48 blocks of HDB flats and jointly create a new Singapore Record.

30 students and 5 teachers from GIIS East Coast Campus had the privilege of attending the inaugural ceremony of a year-long celebration commemorating 50 years of diplomatic ties between Singapore and India. 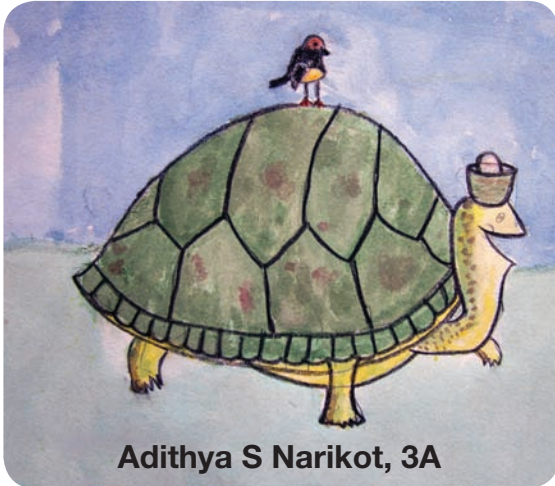
THE TREASURE CHEST

Shopping for precious stones on the road side.

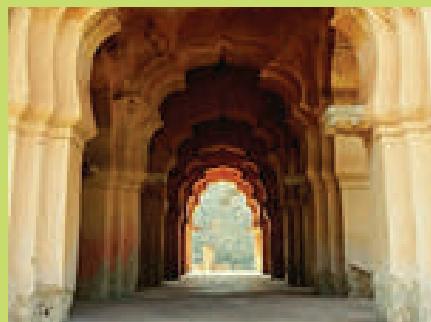
The glory that was India is something I learnt first-hand when I visited Hampi, the capital of the Vijayanagara dynasty, this December 2014 with my parents and grandfather. I had heard a lot about Hampi from my grandfather and was therefore, quite keen to visit it. Hampi the city existed from 1363-1565. It is amazing how well the monuments and temples have all been preserved. My grandfather told me that Hampi was such a prosperous city that shopkeepers actually sold gold, diamonds and pearls on the roads! The remains of these shops are still visible.

The Mughals waged war on this kingdom which resulted in the end of the Vijayanagara Empire. Apparently Hampi was so rich that even a thousand elephants and a thousand camels belonging to the Mughals could not transport all the riches!

Our next stop was the

Lotus Mahal. It is a beautiful mandapa. A mandapa is a porch, usually a temple porch. The first floor of this mandapa has been made such that in summer, it is cool inside though the temperature outside may be hot. Hampi is surrounded by rocky mountains and so it can get really scalding hot in summer. Unfortunately, the first floor has been closed to tourists because some careless people carved things on the walls. My grandfather told me that when he was a boy, he used to sleep there in the summer. How lucky! It's not allowed anymore though. We then saw the elephant's stables. They were the stables for the king's 11 favourite elephants. There were some beautiful carvings here as well. The museum houses artefacts such as paintings, sculptures, cannon balls and broken pots found onsite by the Archaeological Department of India. It was amazing to see these items and connect them to life back then.

The Hazaar Rama temple is so named because it is made of a thousand carvings depicting scenes from the Ramayana. Our last stop was the Vijaya Vitthala Temple. This temple is known for its musical pillars. Each set of pillars show a person with a particular musical instrument in his hands. When one taps on these pillars, the temple reverberates with the musical notes in the sounds of that instrument – sa re ga ma pa dha ni sa. From the temple we walked down to the River Tungabhadra where there was a sacred mandapa, where apparently the Saint Purandara Dasa used to compose his songs.

THE GREAT RUSSIAN ESCAPE-THE STORY OF TERROR AND FRIGHT

"This incident happened to me when I was a young lad. I just began my life as an entrepreneur. All was going well until this tragedy struck. It was the worst instance of my life. I can never forget that incident," Recalls Mr Robert Downing, the 50 year old founder of Life Solutions. He was one of those unfortunate passengers on board the Air America flight AA201 that was cruelly shot down by rebels in St Petersland. He was the only survivor of the gruesome crash.

"On the morning of January, the twentieth, I was in my cabin when I received a call from the World Business Association.

The officer told me that I was going to Computer Valley in Businessville area to attend the annual meeting of the association. I was ecstatic. The officer also told me that the association sponsored the trip and that I was scheduled to fly on the morning of January, the twenty – second. "

"On the night of January, the twenty-first, I had nightmares about the plane crashing and bursting into flames. Little did I know that the nightmare was going to be true. The next morning, I was delighted to know that it was the twenty – second of January. I left for the airport. Before reaching the airport, I spoke to my mum and bid her farewell. It would have been my last word with my mum."

"In the plane, about three hours after we took off, I heard a loud thud. It was the sound of the plane being shot. The plane crashed and I was knocked out instantly. The rebels came that time and imprisoned me. A rebel felt very sad for me and heard my story. By the end of the story, I felt weak and faint. He helped me escape. I went straight to the British High Commission. I still can't believe how I walked until the High Commission. The officials helped me get back home."

"Now, I am just happy to be alive," says the entrepreneur as he prepares to retire for the day.

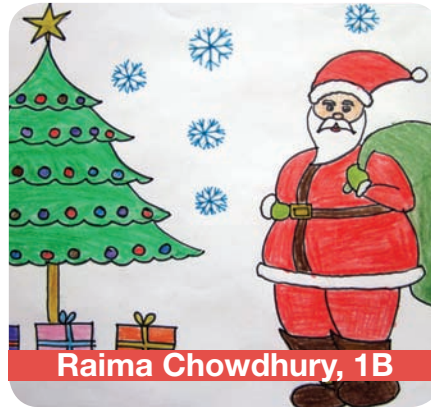

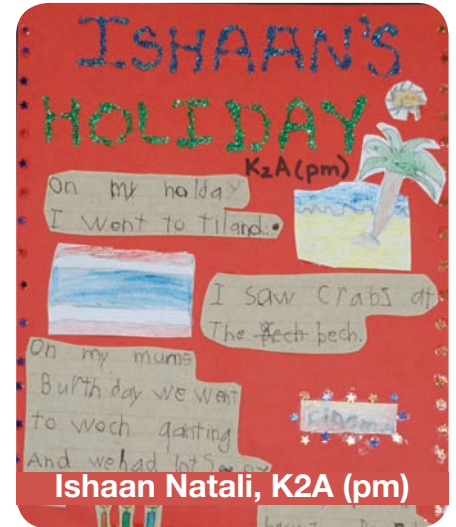

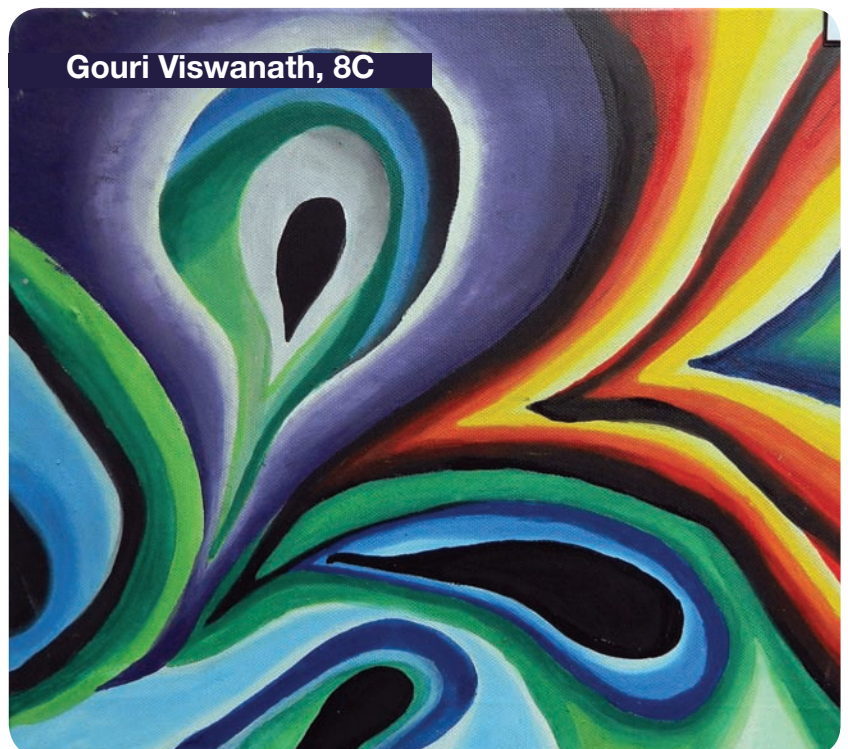

गौरिला, जिम्पेन्ज़ी, बबून और गिबबन वनमनुष्य जाति के बंदर हैं। इनकी दुम नहीं होती है और वे मनुष्य की तरह दो पैरों पर शरीर सीधा कर चल सकते हैं। इसी कारण इस जाति के बंदरों को वनमनुष्य कहा जाता है।

भारत में पाए जाने वाले वनमनुष्य को हुक्कु बंदर भी कहते हैं। यह असम, अस्साचल प्रदेश मेघालय, त्रिपुरा और मिजोरम से लेकर बंगलादेश, म्यांमर और दक्षिण के सदा-हरित वनों में पाया जाता है।

भारत के लगभग हर चिड़ियाघर में इसको देखा जाता है, लेकिन वृद्ध होने पर मादा हुक्कु के शरीर का रंग भूरा हो जाता है जिनकी सहायता से ये पेड़ों पर झूलती हुई लंबी दूरियाँ तय करती हैं।

अपने दल से बात करने या उनका ध्यान आकर्षित करने के लिए यह हुक्कु-हुक्कु की ज़ोरदार आवाज़ करता है। इसलिए इसका नाम हुक्कु बंदर रखा गया है। हर बंदर की तरह इसका प्रमुख भोजन फल है लेकिन ये कंदमूल, अंडे और मकड़ियों को भी शौक से खाते हैं। इनकी ऊँचाई लगभग तीन फुट और वज़न छह से आठ किलो तक होता है। चिपेंज़ी जाति के वनमनुष्य सबसे बुद्धिमान समझे जाते हैं। वे अपने भोजन के लिए कीड़-मकोड़ों की तलाश करते हैं। बबून जाति की मादा खतरे का आभास होते ही छोटे बच्चों को लेकर पेड़ों व सुरक्षित स्थान पर जा बैठती है जबकि नर खतरे का सामना करते हैं। सभी जातियों के वनमनुष्य एकदूसरे के बदन से गंदगी को हटाकर बालों की सफाई करने में एक-दूसरे की मदद करते हैं।

वे दो से पाँच तक के दल में रहते हैं, सांकेतिक भाषा बोलते हैं और अपने खास संकेतों से वे परिवार में एक दूसरे के साथ संपर्क बनाए रखते हैं।
